Introduced in 1990, the Friends of Singa (FOS) programme seeks to empower students to take the lead in fostering kindness within their schools through a five-month campaign. In this programme, students are encouraged to identify issues within their school community and implement meaningful solutions that promote kindness. By the end of the campaign, our hope is that participants will understand the vital role they play in making a positive difference. Upon completing their kindness campaign projects, participating schools will be recognised for their commitment to building a kinder nation and will be awarded for their sustained participation in FOS. The Singapore Kindness Movement (SKM) believes that by recognising these students, we can inspire a wave of kindness that will continue to grow within schools and beyond.

SPREADING COMPASSION @AIPS THROUGH CYBER KINDNESS AND HARMONY ACTIVITIES

AIPS FOS project cultivates empathy and compassion through P5 Performance Tasks and Kindness Day activities, empowering students to demonstrate school values while appreciating cultural diversity.

AIPS FOS project comprised two components: the Primary 5 Social Studies Performance Task and AIPS Kindness Day.

(i) P5 SS Performance Task P5 students explored "How can we promote Cyber Kindness and Harmony through aesthetics?" aligned with "Our People, Our Tapestry" theme. Using Differentiated Instruction, interest-based groups followed a structured template over five-six weeks (Terms 2-3), researching and consulting teachers before presenting campaigns on inclusivity, cultural diversity, and empathy to P2 and P5 students during recess.

(ii) AIPS Kindness Day On 11 November 2025, AIPS commemorated its inaugural Kindness Day with World Kindness Day. P1-P6 students participated in assembly programmes and recess activities promoting inclusivity and celebrating abilities of people with disabilities. CCE Ambassadors facilitated booths showcasing P5 projects, kindness games using SKM resources, and Purple Parade visual impairment experiences.

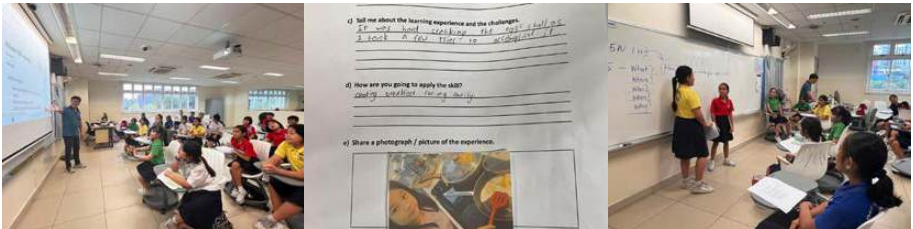

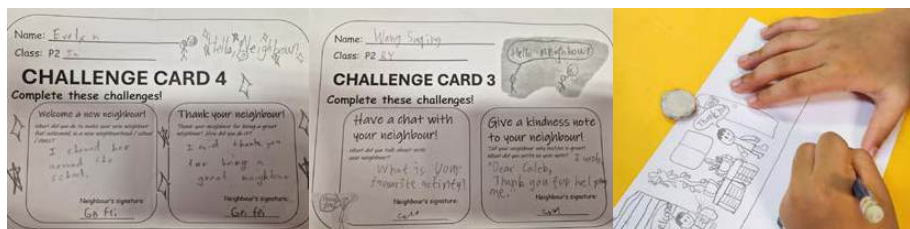


FIRST TOA PAYOH PRIMARY SCHOOL

NEIGHBOURLINESS BEGINS WITH ME!

To nurture everyday acts of neighbourliness among students, fostering a caring and inclusive school community.

From May to August, FTPPS ran a Values in Action initiative to promote neighbourliness among Primary 2 students, guided by Primary 5 Peer Support Leaders. The P5s created fortnightly challenge cards with kindness tasks, which P2s completed and had acknowledged by recipients. Those who completed all tasks received affirmation certificates. During recess, Peer Support Leaders gave out hand-coloured bookmarks to students showing kindness. A drawing activity also allowed P2s to express their understanding of neighbourliness, with selected entries awarded. THINK BEFORE YOU CLICK: END CYBERBULLYING NOW

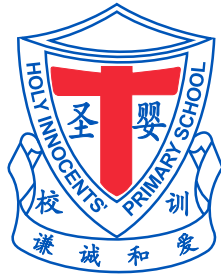
The project promotes cyber kindness and equips students at Henry Park Primary School with the skills to combat cyberbullying in an evolving digital landscape.

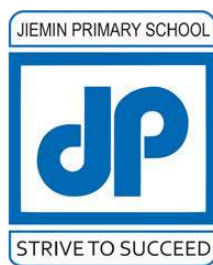
Promoting positive community living by fostering neighbourly awareness and connections.

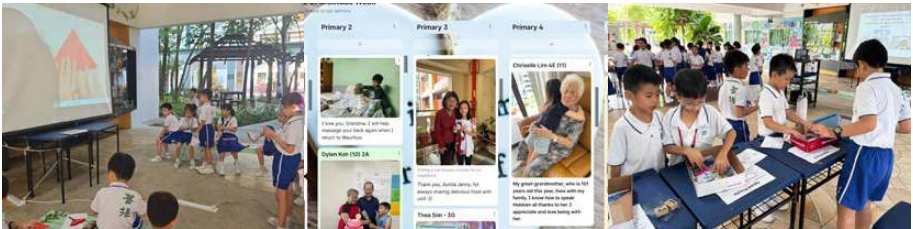

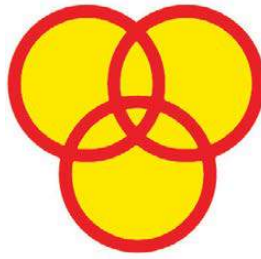
Mee Toh School's Primary 1 IPW-VIA project nurtures empathy, teamwork, and active citizenship through 100 acts of kindness over six months.

KINDNESS COUNTS: SMALL ACTS, BIG IMPACT

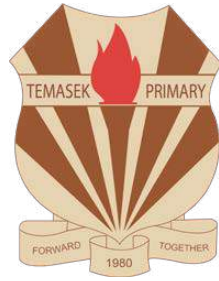
Promoting neighbourliness to build a cohesive, resilient community through trust, support, and acts of kindness.

PROMOTING INCLUSIVITY AND ADDRESSING CHILDREN'S ISSUES THROUGH PEER SUPPORT

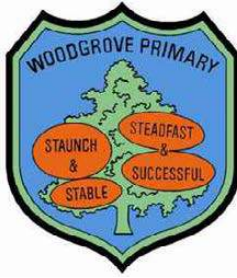

Activities are embedded in daily routines—recess sessions, pre-assembly programmes, and home-school partnerships via SLS. Guided by PSLs, students relied on other senses and reflected on diverse abilities. 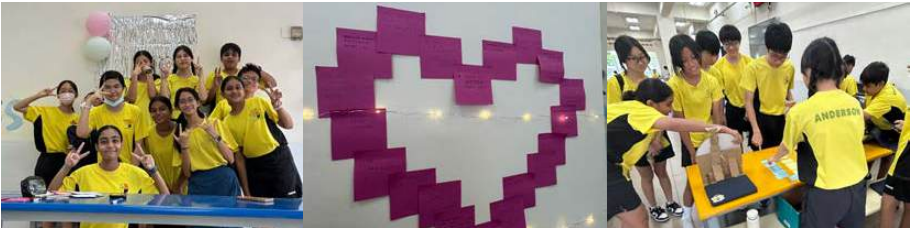

FRIENDS OF SINGA – CYBER KINDNESS

Promoting respect, empathy, and responsibility online through the Friends of Singa Cyber Kindness campaign.

As part of the Friends of Singa Cyber Kindness campaign, the school carried out a comprehensive program to raise awareness on cyberbullying and promote positive online behavior. A school-wide presentation during morning assembly highlighted the emotional and psychological effects of cyberbullying, while also emphasizing two important themes: the importance of being an upstander—someone who actively supports and defends others facing online harassment—and the need to be kind online. STORIES OF YESTERYEARS

Promoting empathy and respect for seniors through storytelling and intergenerational interaction.

The *Stories of Yesteryears* campaign began with awareness activities, where students were briefed on the importance of silver wellness and respect for seniors. Secondary 1 students were paired with Secondary 3 mentors to brainstorm traditional games, performance ideas, and questions to engage the elderly residents. The objective was to build a culture of gratitude and strengthen bonds within the class by encouraging students to appreciate one another.

The *Cards of Kindness* campaign, led by Sec 3 VIA leaders as part of the Friends of Singa project, aimed to promote kindness, inclusivity, and a stronger sense of belonging in BGSS. Each student received a “kindness bag” on their locker to collect notes, while VIA leaders facilitated sessions for classmates to write and exchange encouraging messages. 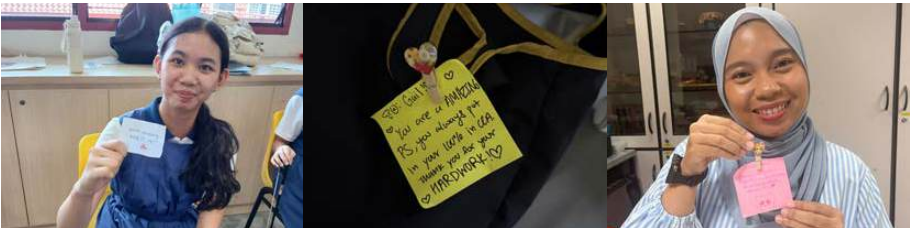

Promoting recognition, support, and kindness in CCAs to inspire both members and the wider school community.

To promote kindness across the school, several initiatives were carried out. The Tags-of-Love initiative involved CCA leaders attaching notes of encouragement with pegs to the bags of three peers within their CCA, who then passed them on to others, including CCA teachers, creating a ripple effect of positive messages. Interviews were conducted with selected students and teachers to explore how kindness is practiced and the often-unseen efforts within their CCAs, as well as the benefits of such initiatives for both the CCA and the wider school community. School presentations were also held to publicize the initiative, share updates, and encourage the entire student body to continue spreading kindness. 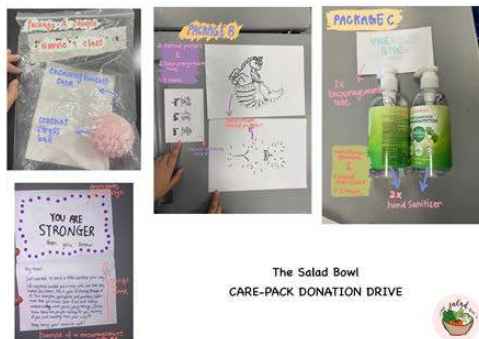
THE SALAD BOWL

Raising awareness on casual racism and bullying to build a supportive, inclusive school community.

The experience taught valuable skills in conducting interviews and raising awareness about inclusivity. Moving forward, the campaign hopes to inspire continued efforts to ensure no one feels left behind, and that everyone feels respected, heard, and appreciated in all settings.

The campaign successfully revived interest in cultural traditions while promoting empathy, respectful communication, and stronger peer connections.

To raise awareness and empathy toward the visually impaired, our campaign was carried out in two phases. The impact of the Dialect Workshop led to plans for continued Hokkien classes in 2026 and the potential addition of Cantonese, underscoring the project's lasting cultural and educational value. By blending broad outreach with intimate, hands-on experiences, *Bridging Generations* laid a strong foundation for future efforts to honour elders, preserve heritage, and build a more connected and respectful school community.

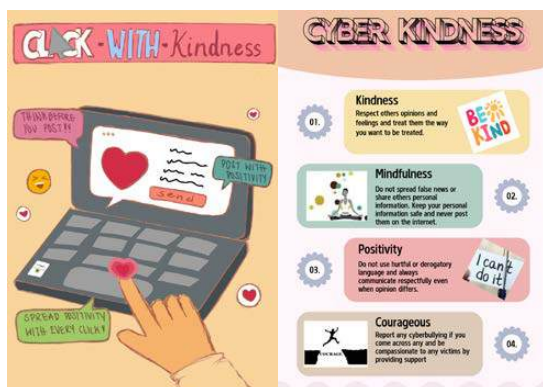

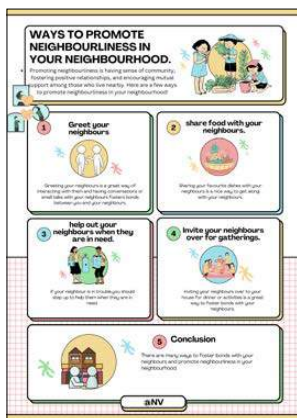

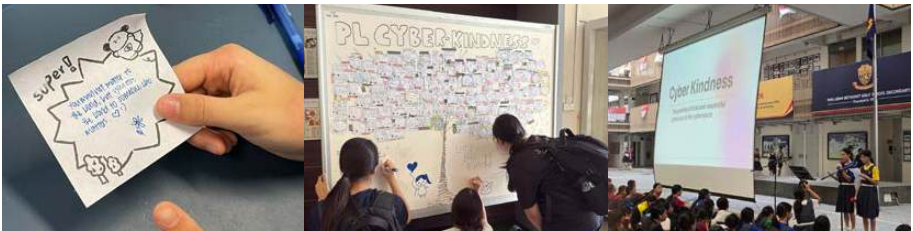

PROMOTING SAFE AND KIND DIGITAL SPACES

This makes spreading information more convenient and efficient.

“Paper Hugs” is a student-led campaign by West Spring Secondary School that fosters empathy and uplifts elderly and cancer patients at NTFGH through heartfelt notes and meaningful interactions.

The Paper Hugs campaign unfolded in four phases. 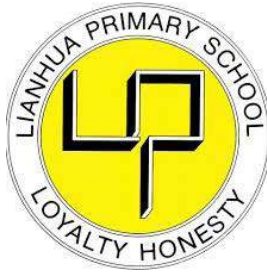
