THE FRIEND OF SINGA AWARD 2019

Introduced in 1990, the Friend of Singa (FOS) is into its 29^{th} year as it continues to promote the essential values of respect, social and self responsibility, selflessness and love behind the kind acts of young, caring individuals.

Since its revamp in 2009, all participating teams will have to complete a kindness project within their school community over a period of five months. These projects should create a positive impact within the school community and the students' behaviours.

FOS has moved away from merit-based awards to one that focuses on sustained participation from schools. To help kick-start these projects, SKM funds up to \$150 per project.

Building on the notion of collective kindness, the theme for FOS 2019 is "_____.

Be Greater!"

AN OVERVIEW OF THE FRIEND OF SINGA PROGRAMME

All schools are encouraged to participate in the Friend of Singa Programme.

Participating schools are invited to nominate **up to nine students** for this programme. Upon nomination, all participants, students and teachers will attend a half-day workshop in February to equip themselves with design thinking, project management and public speaking skills.

The students then identify areas where they feel social graces are lacking in their respective schools and come up with a creative solution to address the problem. They have up to five months to complete the project.

These students will be honoured as Friend of Singa Ambassadors upon completing a kindness project together. The Singapore Kindness Movement (SKM) hopes that by giving the students such recognition, it will encourage their peers to emulate their fine examples.

The programme is now based on sustained participation; schools will be awarded based on the number of years they have participated. Accordingly, the projects are now categorised as:

- 2. Inspiring Social Etiquette Initiatives
- 3. Appealing Murals, Designs & Craftworks
- 4. Heartfelt Appreciation Initiatives
- 5. Interesting & Unique Initiatives and Challenges
- 6. Heart-warming Community Service Segments
- 7. Interesting Social Media / Online Initiatives & Digital Content

The projects submitted this year continue to impress. Most of them have been thorough, engaging and creative in their methods to achieve greater impact and sustainable participation from their peers. To broaden the scope and depth of their projects, some even went beyond the campus to involve external parties like Family Central, MINDS and Sunlove Senior Activity Centre.

Values in Action Cleaning Programme – Classes took turns turns to clean up the canteen. This encouraged students to appreciate the work of the cleaning staff in school.



Good Habits Presentation – Ambassadors educated Primary 1 and 2 students on good toilet habits to keep the toilet clean.


'Keep the Toilet Clean' Poster Design – Primary 1 students coloured posters to remind each other to keep the toilets clean.

This was a school-wide project to thank non-teaching staff, like the admin staff, librarians, technical support staff and cleaners, for their hard work.



THE KINDNESS BADGE AWARD 2019

The Kindness Badge is a mark of distinction awarded to students in Uniformed Groups who have completed tasks or projects that promote kindness and graciousness amongst their peers, within their schools, and to their families and communities. Achieving this badge identifies them as Ambassadors of Kindness. It is awarded by the Singapore Kindness Movement to students who have demonstrated their passion and commitment to fostering a gracious society.



BRONZE

Focused on Learning, the Bronze Badge programme introduces students to the current state of kindness in the community. The Bronze level is compulsory and a prerequisite to the Gold Badge level.



SILVER

Focused on Training, the Silver Badge scheme provides an opportunity for students to carry out kindness campaigns within their school. The Silver level is optional.



GOLD

Focused on Execution, the Gold Award is conferred when students extend the reach of their campaign to the community. Students are tasked to demonstrate how they can do their part in tackling community issues such as neighbourliness, online etiquette and local and foreigner integration.
